Twentieth Sunday after Pentecost

The holy martyr Nestor learned of Christianity from St. Demetrius the Great Martyr. Nestor was moved to defend Christians being tortured in the arena of Salonica, and defeated the brute gladiator who was killing the innocents. The emperor Maximian ordered Nestor to be beheaded. (306)

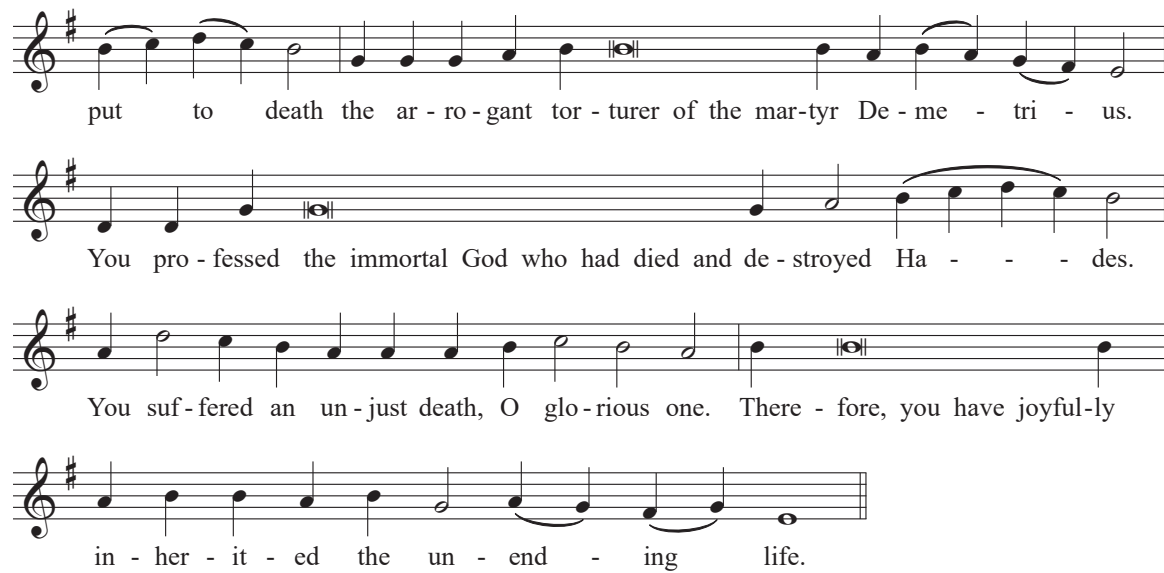

Tru-ly streng-thened by the words of God, O wise Nes - tor, you cour-age-ous - ly



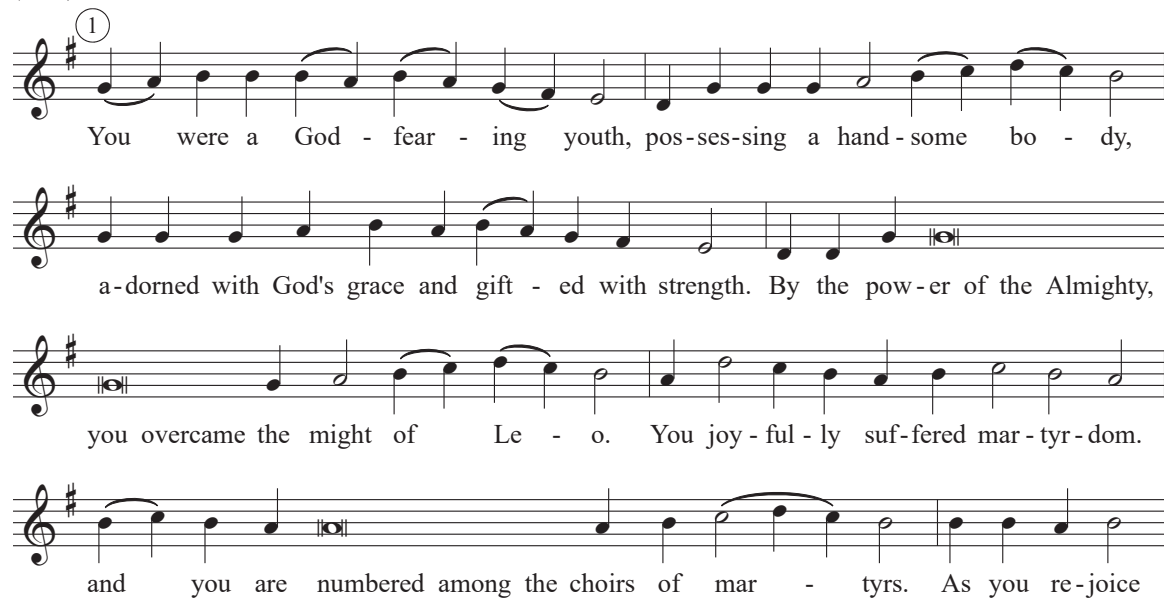
put to death the ar-ro-gant tor-turer of the mar-tyr De-me-tri-us.

you overcame the might of Le-o. You joy-ful-ly suf-fered mar-tyr-dom.

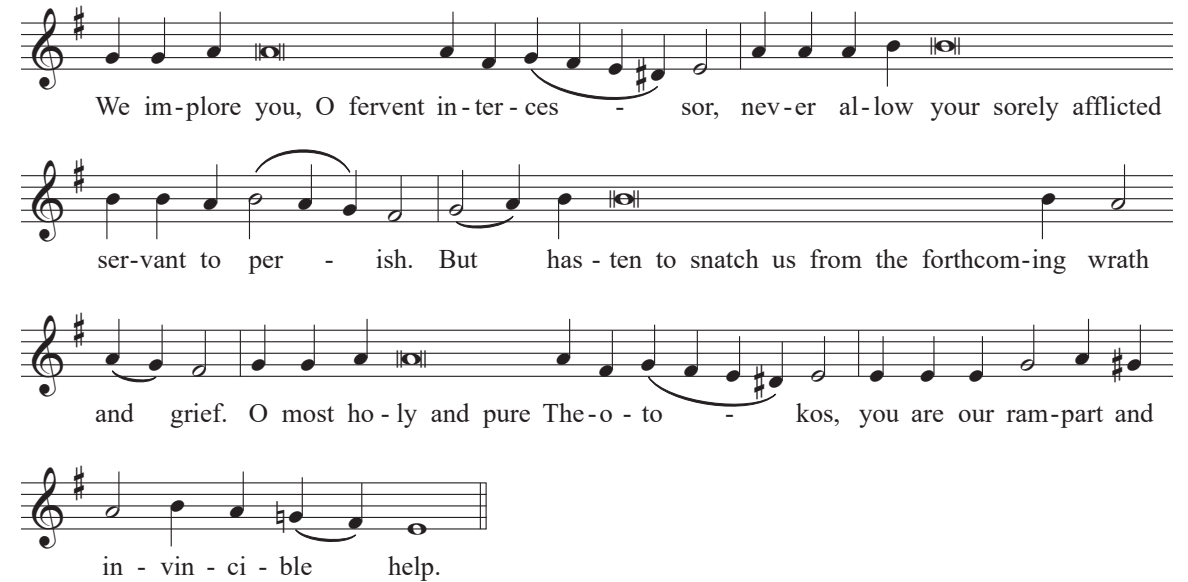
and you are numbered among the choirs of mar-tyrs. As you re-joice
